Welcome to Week 2 Along the Rainbow!

I had a rather grounded start to the Pride Season this year. My good friend and roommate Karen Cusson, directed a play reading of The Laramie Project



in a two night production at the Epiphany Episcopal & Lutheran Church of Marina. It was good; standing-ovation good!

The play is in the style of verbatim theatre in which all of the lines are from direct interviews of the real life participants. The Matthew Shepard Foundation <u>website</u> writes,

"After Matthew's murder in 1998, members of the Tectonic Theater Project in New York City traveled to Laramie, Wyoming, to interview residents about how the attack on Matt had affected the town. These transcripts were transformed into the play The Laramie Project, which tells the stories of real people who lived at the epicenter of one of the nation's most heinous anti-gay hate crimes.

The Laramie Project is one of the most frequently performed plays in America, as its messages still resonate with audiences today. The Matthew Shepard Foundation supports dozens of productions of The Laramie Project and its epilogue The Laramie Project: Ten Years Later every year across the country. It's the goal of the Matthew Shepard Foundation to create an environment where people are afforded an opportunity to discuss the play and its messages, the hate they encounter in their own lives, and how they can work collectively to build a more understanding and compassionate community."

The next morning, I brought my pup, Sheena, to her first Pride parade in Santa Cruz where we marched along in the Monterey Peninsula Pride contingent. Taking in these vastly different experiences back-to-back, I can't help reflecting on the astonishing breadth of LGBTQ+ experience.

For millennia, sex and gender minorities were incorporated into indigenous communities and societies around the world until the rise and spread of corporate patriarchal religions which drove us underground and systematically attempted to erase us from living memory. Consequentially, our movement is born out of pain, suffering and oppression.

But, like the phoenix, we are immortal and are eternally resurrected from the ashes of homophobia and transphobia into a spectacular display of resiliency, flamboyance and fabulousness.

Therefore Pride Month includes all the hues of the human experience. In equal measure, Pride Month is a time to honor and commemorate the pain, struggles and sacrifices of generations of fallen heroes, sheroes and queeroes; to embody as best we can the righteous rebel energy of Stonewall that says "we're not putting up with this s--t anymore; and to celebrate the extraordinary achievements of our movement and our people along the rainbow!

Monterey, CA - Join Monterey Peninsula's LGBTQIA+ and ally community for a family-friendly day of camaraderie, joy, and pride on Saturday, June 29, 2024, as we march and dance down Alvarado Street and celebrate at the Monterey State Historic Park's Custom House Plaza.

The theme for 2024 is "Be Queer Here." This theme serves two essential aspects of our organization and community. First, it reflects our firm commitment to supporting LGBTQIA+ individuals and communities, promoting acceptance, and ensuring that queer identities are respected and celebrated without erasure. Second, it is a nod to the reality that while San Francisco and the broader Bay Area are often associated with queerness and celebration, this spirit can also thrive right here in Monterey! Our community has always existed, and we want everyone who visits Monterey, or calls this place home, to understand that they can embrace their authentic selves.

The day will start with the Pride Parade, which will kick off at 11:00 a.m. starting on Polk Street near Alta Bakery. Our Grand Marshall, Quazar Goings, will lead the parade down Alvarado Street where we will end at Custom House Plaza. When asked about the importance of queer existence, Quazar said that "being queer is a rare and precious gift; queer lives transform a drab and monotonous existence into a creative celebration of joy and authenticity."

Following the parade, the celebration will take place at Custom House Plaza by Fisherman's Wharf at 12:00 p.m., and includes speakers and entertainment. Local musicians will get the dance party started and there will be drag performances by queens Rogue Roulette and Khloe Quarterpounder, and others! New this year is our Queer Youth Awards portion of the stage program where we will award a number of queer students with scholarships to honor their commitment to going above and beyond in advocating for the local LGBTQIA+ community.

We will have over 65 local agencies tabling during the celebration portion of our event representing healthcare, non-profit, wellness, faith-based, art groups, and local food trucks that will provide meals and refreshments. This is a FREE event for the all ages, although donations are encouraged.





MEET THE PRIDE 2024 GRAND MARSHAL

Quazar (they-them-their) currently identifies as a bigender androsexual. Quazar is a founding organizer for Monterey Peninsula Pride, is a former president of the organization, and now serves as an emeritus board member. Quazar's roots in activism lay in their struggle to integrate intersectional identities whose communities were often at

odds with one another; specifically, African American, Christian and LGBTQ+ identities and communities.

Seeking a spiritual community where they could be openly gay, they moved from Seaside to San Francisco in 1987 and got involved with an LGBTQ+ serving new age / omnifaith church called Radiant Light Ministries. Radiant Light taught that our spiritual potential is activated by serving our communities.

At 43, they enrolled at Cal State Monterey Bay as an undergraduate where

they discovered their inner activist. Quazar's graduating capstone project was *Queer Spirit: Queer Navigations of Christian Cultural Terrain*. They were a co-founder of the LGBTQ+ student club Out and About (now the Pride Club), and was among the first group of CSUMB's Rainbow Graduates in 2010. In 2014, they were recognized for their HIV/AIDS activism by Central Coast HIV/AIDS Services.

Over the years, Quazar has co-designed LGBTQ+ Safe Zone training for CSUMB, Hartnell and Interim, Inc. Quazar is among the original organizers of Monterey Peninsula Pride's first parade and program in 2017. Each non-COVID year they have organized the MPP's interfaith welcome and pride panel.

Last summer, they facilitated a transgender mental health panel for The Village Project, Inc. This summer at the Village Project, they will be facilitating a celebration of local LGBTQ+ activist a week before Monterey Pride's parade and celebration.

Quazar currently works at CSUMB, where they co-facilitate the LGBTQ+ counseling and support group for students and co-facilitate the CSUMB LGBTQ+ Employees Affinity Group which was instrumental in developing CSUMB's Rainbow Raft Pride Center which opened in May 2024. They are honored to serve as Monterey Peninsula Pride's Grand Marshal for its 2024 Parade and Celebration.

About JT Mason

Community Activist to be celebrated at Rainbow Panel Event

JT grew up in the Unitarian Universalist Church. She says, "part of your DNA when you are raised that way is social action. We have seven principles one



of which is the belief in the inherent worth and dignity of all. So, to put my faith into action is to be a community organizer."

As a young adult, JT, began her community organizing within the women's movement. She was instrumental in creating the vibrant and thriving women's community in the Monterey Bay Area. In 1978 she co-founded Demeter Resources, a non-profit organization which focused on women and lesbian rights, news and music. Demeter also promoted women's athletics, sponsoring entry-level and advanced women's softball and basketball teams. JT was named one of Monterey County's Outstanding Women by the Commission on the Status of Women in 1992. Between 1995 and 2000, she sat on the national board of the Association of Women's Music and Culture.

JT began her career in public radio hosting a variety of shows on KAZU and KUSP starting in 1979. JT worked for 28 years at KAZU as the longtime programmer of My Sister's House, Monday Morning Folk and the Roadside Café.

JT has also had three decades worth of association with the Monterey County Chapter of the National Coalition Building Institute where she has served on leadership teams for various community workshops focused on prejudice reduction and multicultural community building.

In 1999, JT and her wife Gretchen became the first openly same sex couple to legally adopt a child in Monterey County.

In 2001, she began working as a youth counselor and teacher at the Unitarian Universalist Church of the Monterey Peninsula working extensively with children and youth educational programs. She was also very involved in the congregation's anti-racism and anti-oppression efforts. As part of her commitment to anti-racism work, JT, contributed to the anthology Combined Destinies, White's Sharing Grief About Racism in 2013. In 2015, she co-founded two different organizations, Whites for Racial Equity and Palenke Arts. Like many other local community activists, JT, attended the vigil called by the Monterey County Branch NAACP on the steps of Seaside's City Hall in response to the murder of nine worshipers at AME church in Charleston, South Carolina. At the vigil, Ann Todd Jealous, challenged white folks in attendance not to return to their lives as usual following the vigil. JT, really heard her and so she brought together local white activists to found Whites for Racial Equity where she has served on the steering committee since its inception. WRE has served as a launching pad for White folk to get involved as allies in backing the efforts of organizations that serve people of color such as the NAACP, the Village Project and Palenke Arts.

Palenke Arts was co-founded with Juan Sanchez and a committed group of artists and educators to address the issue of inequity in the arts by imbuing their programs with high-interest, culturally relevant art and music programs. JT served as the founding board president.

Following the 2016 Pulse Street Massacre of LGBTQ+ People of Color at an Orlando gay nightclub, Jt joined local efforts to build greater activist networking capacity within the queer community by working to establish the non-profit, Monterey Peninsula Pride. JT has provided years of support for Salinas Valley Pride as well.

Other community organizing has included:

 \cdot Board membership on the TWCA where se played a part in the launch of its domestic violence crisis line and the creation of the Mildred Lawson safe house for women and children

· Several years volunteering for Hospice of the Central Coast

 Many years as a foster volunteer for Animal Friends Rescue Project for whom she has nurtured countless litters of kittens and for which she adopted several rescue pups and kittens over the years.

JT has also had a great impact on her frequent collaborators.

 \cdot Palenke Arts founder, **Juan Sanchez**: "JT is a true visionary, she believes in the power of love, spirituality, social justice and the arts to transform communities."

• UUCMP Revs. **Axel and Elaine Gehrmann**: She and her wife Gretchen have hosted numerous fantastic church events at their home. JT has used her beautiful artistic skills to create a number of gorgeous mosaics gracing the walls of our church. Our gratitude and appreciation for her are beyond words, and we aspire to be more like her in all we do."

• **Sue Parris**, national president of the Board of Directors of NCBI International: "JT has committed countless acts of kindness and generosity to individuals and families (many people of color, immigrants and other marginalized folks). We'll never know how many lives she has touched."

public, an out lesbian living a busy life, loving a partner, adopting a child, doing social change work. In some cases, her very presence on the air, her humor, her open heart saved lives."

"My mom was an activist and union-organizer so my activism probably started in the womb, and most certainly in baby carriages on picket lines. She was active in civil rights and farmworker struggles so growing up I just assumed that fighting for justice was just what one did."

1978 -- First Monterey Bay activism was 1978, working to defeat the **Briggs Initiative**, along with lesbian comrades Mickey Welsh, Kathy Stoner, JT Mason, Bev Harrison, and Claire Parish, and straight ally Dick Criley with the ACLU

1978-1985 -- Co-founded **Demeter Resources**, a nonprofit women's organization, dedicated to the growth of the feminist community and the development of women's culture in the Monterey Bay area. Worked as editor, typesetter, production/design artist, and press operator for *Demeter*, Monterey area newspaper that explored feminist issues and concerns and provided information on organizations and activities of interest to the local women's community. Topics addressed include sexuality, race, gender equality, sexism, gay rights, reproductive rights, and violence against women. Issues also include poetry and articles about books and music. Also worked to organize women's music events, bringing lesbian and feminist artists to the Monterey Peninsula. Also organized women's sporting leagues, with beginner and advanced softball and

basketball teams.

1994-2005 -- Founding member of the Monterey Bay Area chapter of the **National Coalition Building Institute**, formed to promote grassroots leadership training and facilitate coalition building between community social action organizations. Conducts community workshops on diversity, unlearning racism and anti-oppression work in the schools, churches, government agencies, businesses and non-profit agencies.

 In 2015, Deb received the Civil Rights Advocate and Ally Award, from the Monterey County NAACP for her dogged intervention in the case of Dennise Jackson, an African American CSUMB student who turned to the NAACP campus chapter for assistance. Ms. Jackson was wrongly discriminated against against when she was kicked out of student housing due to a mutual altercation with her white roommate who was not similarly asked to leave. Additionally, formal charges were filed against Ms. Jackson. Through the work of Deb Busman, it was ultimately determined that the original CSUMB police report was biased and the charges were dropped.

OUR STORY

The Village Project, Inc. (TVPI) was founded to meet the needs of the underserved African-American community. We now provide services and advocate for the Black Indigenous People of Color (BIPOC) and the LGBTQ+ community.

TVPI came to life as a result of the passage of the Mental Health Services

Act (MHSA) of 2004. Prior to our creation, focus groups were held, which stimulated the creation of an organization where BIPOC and LGBTQ+ people could work through the traumas they faced with the help of trusted practitioners who looked like them and understood their cultural dynamics.

Our state and county-wide work benefits our constituency by providing free counseling and other clinical and educational support services to youth, adults, and families, who have been historically unserved, underserved, or inappropriately served by mental health and educational systems in Monterey County.

OUR MISSION

We provide vulnerable adults, children, and families from historically underserved communities in Monterey County with culturally appropriate mental health services, educational support, and social advocacy so that they can become self-sufficient, self-directed, and self-determining members of the community.

Conversations with Gay Elders

oin us to watch one in a series of six interviews and conversational documentaries focused on gay men whose journeys of self-discovery precede the era of Stonewall and Gay Liberation. The conversations explore how these men navigated being "different" long before there was any social or political context for a positive LGBT self-image.

CONVERSATIONS WITH GAY ELDERS was a cross-generational collaboration in which producer/director David Weissman (then in his early 60s) worked in partnership with gay men in their 20s and 30s as editors to profile gay men in their 70s and 80s.






